

Wreck a ship activities

Create your own shipwreck; use plasticine, toys and anything else to create a shipwreck scene, tell the story of how the ship became a wreck.



Storm pictures; Splash paint onto paper or put dollops on and blow the paint through a straw to create a stormy picture. Then add a picture of a ship, you could use your picture from the 'build a ship activities'.



Rhyme: Tennyson's Crossing the Bar

This famous poem was written about going across the sand Bar at the entrance to Salcombe harbour where lots of boats have been wrecked. Can you think of somewhere Rocky reef; Make a rocky reef to navigate using cushions or soft toys. If it's not very dark place a torch next to the treasure and then try to navigate the reef to the

treasure while blindfolded. If it is very dark use a torch to help navigate the reef to the treasure.



Shipwreck cookies; Use your favourite cookie recipe or the one below to make cookies shaped like bits of shipwreck and the marine life that might make the shipwreck it's home.



Peanut butter and chocolate chip cookies: In a bowl add $\frac{1}{2}$ cup peanut butter, 2tbsp of oil and $\frac{1}{2}$ cup of sugar and mix. Then add 2 large eggs and $1\frac{1}{2}$ tsp of vanilla extract and mix again. Add $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp baking soda, $\frac{1}{4}$ tsp cinnamon and $\frac{1}{4}$ tsp salt and mix again. Sprinkle in $\frac{1}{2}$ cup of coconut flour, mixing as you add it. Split the mix onto a baking tray lined with baking paper to shape and decorate with chocolate chips. Place in the oven at 180°C for 7minutes then leave to cool.
